

Eligibility

Any US Citizen who has been a National Member of ANS for at least two years, is not a federal government employee, and whose academic and work experience includes one of the following or equivalent:

- ◆ PhD in a nuclear-related discipline and at least one year of experience in a nuclear field,
- ◆ PhD in another science or engineering discipline and at least two years experience in a nuclear field, or
- ◆ MS in engineering with at least three years post-degree experience in a nuclear field.

The Application

Your application for the Glenn T. Seaborg Science and Engineering Congressional Fellowship must include the following information provided in this order:

- ❖ Name
- ❖ Mailing Address
- ❖ Telephone and Fax Numbers
- ❖ Email Address
- ❖ A summary of academic and professional experience (not more than two pages)
- ❖ A summary of contributions to ANS National, Local, or Student meetings or governance (not more than 100 words)
- ❖ A statement of your reason(s) for applying, what you hope to accomplish, and how the Fellowship will benefit you and your employer (not more than two pages)
- ❖ One or two letters of reference

A selection committee will evaluate all complete applications received by April XX, 20XX. Finalists will be invited for interviews which will be held during the 2009 ANS Annual Meeting in June. Final selection will be based on these interviews.

Criteria & Commitment

The following factors are considered during the review of all applications:

- Extent of competence in nuclear science and technology;
- Demonstrated ability to participate in public policy discussions;
- Demonstrated ability in written and oral communications; and
- Contributions to ANS.

Purposes to be fulfilled by the Fellow:

- Make expertise available to legislative and executive branch decision-makers;
- Contribute to the career growth of the Fellow; and
- Provide visibility to ANS.

The Fellow is responsible for his or her living expenses in the DC area and is expected to attend a two-week orientation in September 2009. The Fellowship term is one calendar year, beginning in January 2010.

The Fellow will receive a stipend of \$55,000, plus a small travel allowance to attend ANS national meetings.
